Literature provides imaginative and critical insights into all areas of human experience-war and peace, nature and culture, love and sexuality, selfhood and social identity, justice and atrocity, the sacred and the profane, the burdens of history and the dreams of the future. Learning to attend to the complexities of literary texts helps students become more active and critical readers, and the creative aspects of literary texts highlight the ability of the written word to elicit feeling, to cultivate an imaginative openness to others' experiences, and to call us to account as humans. Studying literature at the college level encourages all graduates of Krishna Chandra College to view the reading of challenging and imaginative texts as an essential and rewarding part of a life-long commitment to learning and growth. Apart from developing the literary skills, the English Honours course help students build skills of analytical and interpretive argument; become careful and critical readers; practice writing-in a variety of genres-as a process of intellectual inquiry and creative expression; and ultimately to become more effective thinkers and communicators who are well-equipped for a variety of careers in our information-intensive society.

They will practice writing as a process of motivated inquiry, engaging other writers' ideas as they explore and develop their own. They will demonstrate an ability to revise for content and edit for grammatical and stylistic clarity. And they will develop an awareness of and confidence in their own voice as a writer.
- 3. **Sense of Genre:** Students will develop an appreciation of how the formal elements of language and genre shape meaning. They will recognize how writers can transgress or subvert generic expectations, as well as fulfill them. And they will develop a facility at writing in appropriate genres for a variety of purposes and audiences.
- 4. **Culture and History:** Students will gain a knowledge of the major traditions of literatures written in English, and an appreciation for the diversity of literary and social voices within—and sometimes marginalized by—those traditions. They will develop an ability to read texts in relation to their historical and cultural contexts, in order to gain a richer understanding of both text and context, and to become more aware of themselves as situated historically and culturally.

- 5. **Critical Approaches:** Students will develop the ability to read works of literary, rhetorical, and cultural criticism, and deploy ideas from these texts in their own reading and writing. They will express their own ideas as informed opinions that are in dialogue with a larger community of interpreters, and understand how their own approach compares to the variety of critical and theoretical approaches.
- 6. **Research Skills:** Students will be able to identify topics and formulate questions for productive inquiry; they will identify appropriate methods and sources for research and evaluate critically the sources they find; and they will use their chosen sources effectively in their own writing, citing all sources appropriately.
- 7. **Oral communication skills:** Students will demonstrate the skills needed to participate in a conversation that builds knowledge collaboratively: listening carefully and respectfully to others' viewpoints; articulating their own ideas and questions clearly; and situating their own ideas in relation to other voices and ideas. Students will be able to prepare, organize, and deliver an engaging oral presentation.

M. Sc. GEOGRAPHY

PROGRAM OUTCOMES

- Students will have a general understanding of the various theoretical and methodological approaches in both physical and human geography and be able to develop research questions and critically analyze both qualitative and quantitative data to answer those questions.

PROGRAM SPECIFIC OUTCOMES

- Students will understand general demographic principles and their patterns at regional and global scales.

- Students will be able to use accepted field, laboratory, geospatial, and statistical techniques to quantify the quantity, characteristics, and history of physical phenomena for geographic research and natural resources management.
- Students will be able to use the scientific method including critical thinking, sampling, hypothesis formulation and testing, and controlled experimentation to assess environmental problems, and be able to effectively communicate research objectives, methodology, results, interpretations, and conclusions in oral and written formats.

Course Outcomes

Financial Accounting

Business Organization and Management

Students will develop a capacity to generate novel ideas and put them into practice. Develop executives with the capability of integrating knowledge of core business functions and applying in complex, ambiguous and unfamiliar management situations. Students are developed with the capability to lead teams as well as be effective team members and who can work and communicate effectively with diverse team members to identify and solve problems and make responsible recommendations.

To impart knowledge about basic communication to enable the students to think, observe and express effectively in this competitive world. To develop the ability of the students to communicate clearly and correctly in English and regional languages on the matters relevant to day to day business operation with emphases on quality of presentation. To help the students for general understanding of the various aspects of business communication and business environment of the country. To develop communication skills and overall personality development of the students

Corporate Accounting

This course aims to enlighten the students on the accounting procedures followed by the Companies. To enable the students to be aware on the Corporate Accounting in conformity with the provision of the Companies Act. The students become expert in corporate account management like liquidation, holding account, amalgamation, absorption and external reconstruction etc. They become familiar about accounts of insurance companies, banking. To give an exposure to the students about company final accounts. The contents of 'Corporate Accounting' have been designed to impart basic knowledge of various aspects of accounting of corporate world.

Indian Contract Act

The basic objective of this course is to provide knowledge about Indian Contract Act.

Cost Accounting

To keep the students conversant with the ever – enlarging frontiers of Cost Accounting knowledge and techniques. The students understand clearly how to reduce and control the cost during the course of production because cost is a vital aspect in the modern business. To provide knowledge about the ascertainment of the profitability of each of the products and advise the management to maximize its profits.

Auditing

This course enables the student to be well versed in the fundamental concepts of Auditing. This course gives the knowledge of examines the principles and practices of internal and external auditing. The students can capable to understand the auditing as a component of recurrent and strategic activities, risk assessment, internal control, systems evaluation, forensic accountability, and contemporary audit issues and challenges

Indian Partnership Act

To equip the students with the concept and practices of Indian Partnership Act and latest judgments. To understand the concept of partnerships and be clear about its essentials. Students clearly understand the 'principal - agent relationship' among the partners. They are enabled to differentiate between partnership and other various forms of organization.

Public Finance

The goal is to develop students' analytical and consulting skills in the area of public finance. The course is targeted to those students whose major is in public administration, business- government relations, or management in the service industry (education, health care, culture, etc.). To introduce students to the public sector reform agenda with a focus on public finance issues. This course is aimed at students who are interested in fiscal policy including tax and expenditure law and policy concerning how to fund government effectively. It examines the key challenges of fiscal policy in achieving sufficient revenues, economic prosperity and development and in addressing social justice and inequality in a context of globalization. The course provides an introduction to public finance law and policy; tax policy principles; and tax reform and law design principles.
